
PRE-K A students were excited to learn the sound /n/! They traced the letter with markers and in the sand tray, turning letters into an interactive adventure!


























Grade 3

The school psychologist, Ms. Mona, worked with Grade 4 students to explain the difference between positive touches, which are given by parents and loved ones without causing discomfort, and touches that make them feel uncomfortable, which should be reported to a trusted adult. She also taught them how to respond if they experience unwelcome touches, encouraging them to say 'no,' move away, and immediately talk to a trusted adult for support and guidance.









Grade 4/P4 students designed an advertisement for a device of their choice, highlighting its features, drawbacks, and uses in clear and precise Arabic. Through this activity, students demonstrated their creative thinking abilities, while developing their writing skills and presenting their ideas in an organized and easily understandable way.








Grade 8

After an extensive journey developing research skills, Grade 8 students have begun presenting their findings, explaining their research methods and the variety of resources they utilized. Joureya led the way, showcasing her remarkable inquiry skills by drawing on a rich array of sources, including news articles, comics, and academic journals, all of which she explored with impressive dedication. Her presentation focused on the causes, events, and consequences of the 2011 revolution in Libya, exemplifying both international-mindedness and outstanding ATL skills. Next, Ibrahim shared a segment of his research, focusing on the story of Khaled Saeed, a key catalyst in Egypt's revolution. It's incredibly rewarding to see students deepen their understanding of complex concepts like power and conflict through such thoughtful research and engagement. More presentations to come!





Grade 8 students continued presenting their findings, demonstrating the knowledge they've gained and engaging with high-order thinking questions, such as evaluating the reliability of their sources and identifying potential bias. Meanwhile, their peers used feedback forms and the feedback ladder to provide constructive, thoughtful comments, helping each presenter reflect and improve on their work.





Grade 8

Grade 8 presentations inspired insightful discussions, with students delving into unique aspects of their chosen countries. Even those who selected the same country used distinct research questions to focus on different perspectives of this broad topic, applying diverse research methods and resources. The audience peer-assessed the presentations using a feedback ladder, while others completed exit tickets to reflect on the new knowledge they gained. It was clear that meaningful discussions and inquiry can truly create wonders in understanding complex topics.







Grade 9

Grade 9 students kicked off an exciting biography exploration this week! After introducing the Statement of Inquiry and key concepts for the unit, students developed inquiry questions together and headed to the library to dive into inspiring biographies. Some chose intriguing figures like Donald Trump, analyzing his speeches and tweets to understand how language reflects character and influences perception—perfectly aligning with our goal to explore and interpret the world. Others selected diverse figures and will be uncovering answers to their inquiry questions through research and presentations. We're excited to see where their inquiries lead!







Grade 9


Grade 9 students recently kicked off their new unit with insightful presentations on contemporary figures of influence, focusing on Donald Trump and Malala Yousafzai. They began with a checklist for creating compelling presentations, challenging themselves to actively engage their audience. Through their research, they learned about Trump's journey into politics and Malala's unwavering courage in the face of the Taliban. The presentations sparked lively curiosity and led to a deeper understanding of these influential figures. The feedback on their work was outstanding, highlighting their growing skills in research, presentation, and engagement.





Grade 9 students recently explored how personal stories reflect historical contexts by presenting on Marie Antoinette, Sojourner Truth, and Martin Luther King Jr. Through these figures, students examined how political and social events shape individual lives and, conversely, how individuals impact their times. From Marie Antoinette's role in the French Revolution to Sojourner Truth's fight for equality and King's vision of justice, each story offered a unique lens into resilience, privilege, and activism. Following their presentations, students created a mind map of key stylistic techniques in autobiographies and will apply this understanding by identifying these techniques in a short excerpt from Seize the Moment as homework. This work not only deepened their grasp of history's complexities but also highlighted the enduring relevance of these voices in today's world.

Exploring Industrial Chemistry: DP2 Students Apply Le Chatelier's Principl

During their Chemistry HL class, DP2 students took a deep dive into the world of industrial chemistry, each choosing a case study focused on a significant industrial process: the Haber-Bosch process, the Contact process, and the chromate-dichromate equilibrium. These processes are not only pillars of modern industry but also provide real-world examples of Le Chatelier's Principle in action.
